Get ready for the "Bohème Smackdown" when Mark Tiarks compares and contrasts Leoncavallo's and Puccini's versions of the work that will kick off The Santa Fe Opera's 2019 season. What was happening in the cut-throat Italian opera world during the 1890s? How did audiences react to each composer's work? How did Puccini's version come to be a perennial favorite, with Leoncavallo's rendition now seldom performed? Mr. Tiarks will illustrate his talk with musical examples.



This speaker delighted Santa Fe Opera Guild audiences in the 2017/2018 season with an examination of how opera music was used in animated cartoons and his presentation about Bernstein's *Candide* and *West Side Story*. His impressive background includes work with The Santa Fe Opera, Chicago Opera Theatre, and Opera Theatre of St. Louis. In his multi-faceted role as Director of Planning and Marketing with The Santa Fe Opera, he was responsible for editing the annual program book, presenting Prelude talks in Stieren Hall, producing community performances featuring the Apprentice Singers, and inaugurating the company's season preview radio broadcasts.

LET'S TALK ABOUT OPERA: A SALON

LET'S TALK ABOUT OPERA: A SALON SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 18, 2:00 - 4:00PM EL DORADO AGAVE RESTAURANT AND LOUNGE 309 W SAN FRANCISCO ST FREE, REGISTRATION REQUIRED

The Salon has become a popular annual Santa Fe Opera Guild tradition since its introduction in 2014. The fifth edition will take place on **Sunday, November 18** in the Agave Lounge at the Eldorado Hotel. Everyone is invited to spend a relaxing afternoon circulating among the six tables that will discuss various aspects of opera:

- From Page to Stage will enable participants to explore books that were the basis for opera adaptations. Chaired by Steve Kerchoff, this table will also solicit suggestions for titles that would be good source material. Come with a list of your favorite titles.
- David Harrington will head up a discussion on the Great Opera Singers of the 21st Century. He commented, "We anticipate a lively discussion. Given that we are 18 years into the new century, there should be plenty of candidates."
- #MeToo in Opera Plots. What could be more timely? Veronica Reed will
 moderate a table discussing sexual harassment in opera storylines. She noted,
 "It should be very interesting to explore who were the perpetrators, who
 were the victims, and what did they do about it?"



- Nearby-ish will look at opportunities to travel outside Santa Fe for our favorite performing art. Have you been to Central City, Dallas, Houston, Los Angeles, San Francisco or Chicago? Mim Chapman, table chair, said, "I'm looking forward to talking about the pros and cons of these relatively accessible destinations."
- Ian Ritchie will lead a discussion about **Trouser Roles and Counter Tenor Heroes**. With roles originally written for castrati, can modern singers still play credible heroes? Do any particular operas come to mind when thinking about this question?
- Ken Hunt will preside over the table discussing **The Future of Opera**. He recently mused, "What inspires an optimistic view? What prompts a pessimistic view? Will opera need to change to survive and thrive? I think it will be a very lively conversation."

Organizers of the Salon have asked people who plan to attend to **register.** While there is no charge for the event, registration helps us anticipate how many will participate. OCT. 31 DEADLINE FOR RENEWING SUBSCRIBERS

Don't forget that October 31 is The Santa Fe Opera Box Office's deadline for renewing ticket subscriptions. The Box Office will begin assigning seats to subscribers in November. Don't delay if you want to request the same seat(s) as the past season.

The 2019 season presents five operas in 36 performances, a special recital by celebrated American soprano Renee Fleming with the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra, and two Apprentice Scenes performances, running from June 28 to August 24, 2019. The Opera's 63rd season, the first to be led by incoming General Director Robert Meya, Artistic Director Alexander Neef, and Music Director Harry Bicket, will explore classic works of the repertory as well as operas new to the Santa Fe Opera and the world's stage.

The 2019 Season offers the following productions: Puccini's *La Bohème*, *The Pearl Fishers* by Bizet, Mozart's *Cosi fan tutte*, *Jenůfa* by Janacek, and the world premiere of *The Thirteenth Child*, a new work based on a fairy tale by the Brothers Grimm.

IN CASE YOU MISSED IT: 2018 ANNUAL MEETING RECAP

Santa Fe Opera Guild members gathered on McCune Terrace on August 28 for our Annual Meeting. Guests enjoyed a lovely buffet and perfect weather. David Harrington, Guild Treasurer, delivered a brief update on our healthy finances, Bill Derbyshire was honored as the Guild's Volunteer of the Year, and Martha Baker introduced board officers for the coming fiscal year.

The highlight of the meeting was a presentation by Missy West, Costume Director for The Santa Fe Opera. She treated attendees to an update on the realities of working with Tyvek to create costumes for *Candide*, sharing numerous insights.

A total of 18 wardrobe managers and dressers worked backstage during each performance of *Candide* because the production called for so many costume changes. Garments had to be designed to enable fast changes. For example, sleeves were lined with a slippery fabric to make it easier for performers to get into and out of costumes.

While printed Tyvek costumes stood up to ordinary wear-and-tear, including machine laundering, the color on painted product was very prone to cracking and peeling. For example, the paint on Cunegonde's red dress for *Glitter and Be Gay* had to be touched up after every performance. Rehearsals revealed that the Tyvek was prone to tears and other damage, leading costumers to conclude that they needed to use fabric for breeches. This was especially true of costumes for Alek Shrader who incorporates many pratfalls into his performances.

Whereas wool or other cloth can be molded to fit a performer, Tyvek doesn't give; it remains flat. It also does not "heal;" a needle or pin leaves a permanent hole in the Tyvek. This means that it is extremely difficult to alter a garment.

The Guild is very grateful to The Santa Fe Opera for allowing us to meet on beautiful McCune Terrace. This event could not have happened without the efforts of many volunteers. Barbara Anderson-Acosta headed up the team that included Maureen Ferg, Marlene Lind, Evelyn Kennedy, Leslie J. Mortimer, Emma Suarez, and Carol Toobin. Well done!

AIDA

This grandest of grand operas features an epic backdrop for what is in essence an intimate love story. Set in ancient Egypt and packed with magnificent choruses, complex ensembles, and elaborate ballets, *Aida* never loses sight of its three protagonists. Few operas have matched Aida in its exploration of the conflict of private emotion and public duty, and perhaps no other has remained to the present day so unanimously appreciated by audiences and critics alike. In what should be a highlight of the new season, soprano Anna Netrebko sings her first Met *Aida*, going toe-to-toe with mezzo-soprano Anita Rachvelishvili as

Together with Faust and Carmen, Samson and Dalila remains the most popular opera in the French repertory. Camille Saint-Saëns displays his talents as a virtuoso mosaicist: the noble spirituality of the subject shifts here towards the grand oratorios of the past; here, monumental frescos come to life, revisiting Gounod and Meyerbeer, while everywhere else there is an almost Wagnerian sensuality floating about, that wild and seductive something associated with Dalila. In a sequence of ideally merged scenes, religion and seduction add up to an irresistible alchemy. Mezzo-soprano Elina Garanca and tenor Roberto Alagna star in this sensual French opera when they open the season in the title roles of Saint-Saëns's biblical

epic *Samson et Dalila*. Darko Tresnjak, who won a Tony Award for Best Direction of a Musical in 2014 for A Gentleman's Guide to Love & Murder, makes his Met debut directing a vivid, seductive staging. 



Monday, November 12: Dinner with Lenny: The Last Long Conversation with Leonard Bernstein by Jonathan Cott. Leonard Bernstein was the first American-born-and-trained conductor of the New York Philharmonic and made his spectacular, unrehearsed debut from the podium in 1943. Not only an historic and celebrated conductor, Bernstein was also a pianist, composer, lecturer, and teacher – he did all with unforgettable élan. He is without a doubt the reigning American classical-music giant and genius of the 20th-century. Who among the baby-boom generation, for instance, does not cherish some memories of his 14 years of televised Young People's Concerts? This series, launched in 1958, won every award for educational television there was to be had. Says reviewer Ray Olson of this volume, "Music and the love that informs it and animates its





performance are the great themes of this talk that scarcely touches anything nonmusical."

Monday, January 14: The Hard Bargain; Music, Medicine, and My Father by David Tucker and Burton Spivak. Tucker and Spivak describe in vivid detail and elegant prose the clash of wills between a famous father and his hard-driving middle son. Richard Tucker, the American superstar tenor from the golden age of the Metropolitan Opera, demanded that his son become a surgeon. Rejecting his father's wishes, David wanted to follow his father onto the opera stage. Their struggle over David's future — by turns hilarious and humiliating, wise, and loving — is played out in medical and musical venues around the world. The father and son strike a bargain, the hard bargain of the title, which permitted both dreams to flicker for a decade until one (the right one, it turns out) bursts into sustaining flame. This heartfelt memoir is conveyed in a moving narrative that one reviewer has called "the most dramatic exploration of the private life of a legendary singer in the annals of opera literature."
